### **RESEARCH GRANT PARTICIPATION:**

#### **Research Grant Participation – Past**

Principal Investigator – National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) Community Violence & Youth: Affect, Behavior, Academics (R01) Grant (1 R01 DA018318), \$2,703,975, 2005-2012

Main Grant Objective - This project, operationally entitled, “Multiple Opportunities to Reach Excellence (MORE) Project” was a prospective longitudinal study of the prevalence of community violence exposure among an epidemiologically-based community sample of 750 primarily African American children – as well as their parents, teachers, and school principals -- who attend six public elementary schools located in urban neighborhoods with varying (low, moderate, high) levels of crime. The project investigated community violence as a risk factor for internalizing and externalizing behaviors, co-occurring substance use, and academic achievement problems. It also identified protective factors that attenuate these adverse outcomes and promote academic success.

Co-Investigator – National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA) Environmental Strategies for Violence and Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention (R01) Grant (PI: C. Deborah Furr-Holden), 2007-2011

Main Grant Objective - This project was an ecological study of neighborhood environmental characteristics in Baltimore City. Independent observations on selected blocks were made electronically by pairs of trained raters using Personal Digital Assistants (PDAs). Raters recorded the presence or absence of items across domains of risk and protective factors related to the physical layout, physical/social order and disorder, violence, evidence of alcohol and other drug activity, adult and child activity by neighborhood blocks. The primary instrument, entitled the “Neighborhood Inventory for Environmental Typology” (NifETy) assessed 158 variables. A subsample of the blocks observed were those in which students participating in Dr. Cooley’s MORE Project lived. That enabled objective measures of neighborhood level indices to be linked to the child, parent, teacher, and school level data that were collected on over 600 families in the MORE Project.

Co-Investigator – National Institute of Nursing Research (NINR) – Domestic Violence Enhanced (DOVE) Home Visitation Program (R01) Grant (PI: P. Sharps), 2006-2011

Main Grant Objective - This study incorporated routine screening for intimate partner violence (IPV) and a structured IPV intervention into existing home visitation (HV) programs for young families expecting a child. Traditional home visitation and Olds model of home visitation programs were examined using a two-group quasi experimental design with nurses randomized to provide a structured IPV intervention to pregnant/postpartum women or to provide standard care or usual care to women who disclose IPV. Home visitors (nurses and trained lay visitors) in each home visitation program were randomized to the intervention or a comparison condition. The study provided intervention efficacy data as well as prospective information about patterns of IPV, maternal health, and infant and child development in homes where there was IPV.

Principal Investigator of Parent Grant – NIDA Diversity Supplement Award to the Community Violence & Youth: Affect, Behavior, Academics Grant (1 R01 DA018318), 2007-2009

Main Grant Objective - This supplement supported, at the Investigator level, Dr. Tanya Quille to permit her to expand her experience and skills as an adult and adolescent substance abuse and HIV/AIDS clinician and project coordinator to become an independent researcher. The NIDA Diversity Supplement capitalized on Dr. Quille’s domains of interest and expertise and applied them to the [then] existing MORE Project parent study by introducing a new domain of focus: High-risk outcomes for children (delinquency, substance use, and HIV risk).

Main Grant Objective The mission of the Center was to improve preventive and treatment interventions by bridging epidemiologic, intervention and services research through the development of a research structure and research strategies capable of evaluating the effectiveness of sustainability of promising an evidence based interventions; identifying factors that inhibit facilitate improved prevention and treatment practices and outcomes, and disseminating knowledge gained in order to improve prevention and treatment research practices.

Main Grant Objective – This project supported a pilot study of a school-based preventive intervention with inner-city children exposed to community violence who were at risk for anxiety disorders. This randomized control longitudinal project contributed to the study and prevention of the mental health effects of community violence on children and provided preliminary data for a future NIMH R01 preventive intervention effectiveness trial.

Main Grant Objective - This project established the Morgan-Hopkins Center for Health Disparities Studies. The purpose of the Center was to conduct community-based participatory research and community health programming with the goal of eliminating health disparities. The Center was a joint entity of Morgan State University and Johns Hopkins University.

Principal Investigator - “Moral-Cognitive Intervention Module for Community Violence-Exposed Children: A Pilot Study,” funded through the CDC-Sponsored JHU Center for the Prevention of Youth Violence (Philip Leaf, Principal Investigator), Johns Hopkins University, 2000-2001, \$15,000.

Main Grant Objective – This project developed and piloted a child-focused cognitive-behavioral intervention module based on Kohlberg’s (1984) cognitive-structural theory and Dodge’s (1986) social-information processing theory. The purpose of the pilot project was to address cognitive distortions and misattributions to increase fifth grade students’ repertoires of responses to ambiguous and threatening situations (with a goal of generating alternatives to aggression). The socio-moral reasoning component was designed as a supplement to an existing anxiety preventive intervention.

Principal Investigator (75% salary support) - NIMH Mentored Scientist Development (K01) Award, “Community Violence: Prevention & Youth’s Mental Health” (1 K01 MH01661), 1998-2004, \$600,005

Main Grant Objective – This program expanded Dr. Cooley-Quille’s research focus from a child clinical to a public mental health perspective; she was able to become an independent mental health prevention researcher over the 5 years of mentored support. Dr. Cooley-Quille studied the role of exposure to pervasive community violence on youth’s development, mental health and their capacity for improvement through preventive intervention trials that were implemented in 1985 and 1986. Dr. Sheppard Kellam served as her primary mentor.
